# Care Connections Launches at Milton Village

Supported by \$1.1 million in Community Foundation grants, Care Connections offers resources to families dealing with dementia.

Close to 80% of people living with dementia are cared for at home—an experience which can be exhausting and isolating for caregivers. Recognizing this, REAL Services has provided support for caregivers for many years, including training, respite, and other services. Now, its new Care Connections program, located in the Hospice Foundation's Milton Village and operated through Alzheimer's & Dementia Services of Northern Indiana, is dramatically increasing its ability to "help the helpers."

Milton Village is a partnership with multiple layers. The building, which was constructed on the site of the old Hospice House in Roseland, is owned by the Hospice Foundation. It houses both Milton Adult Day Services, which is a Center for Hospice service that provides care at an hourly rate for adults with functional and cognitive impairment, and Care Connections, which is a free-of-charge caregiver resource program of Alzheimer's and Dementia Services of Northern Indiana, powered by REAL Services.

"Dementia is just another chronic illness," says Angel Baginske. "People who suffer from it shouldn't be separated from everyone else."

Inspired by the Netherlands-based Hogeweyk Care Concept, Milton Village is deliberately designed to be inclusive.

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illness," says Angel Baginske, director of Alzheimer's & Dementia Services of Northern Indiana, firmly. "People who suffer from it shouldn't be separated from everyone else."

To foster this sense of community, Baginske encourages caregivers and loved ones to enjoy Milton Village's welcoming, broadly-themed spaces together—sharing lunch in its '50s-style cafe, watching a movie in the small theater, or shooting a game of pool in the pub-style common room. There are quiet, restful places to sit or talk throughout the building, with views of Juday Creek and Milton Village's gardens and putting green.

There are opportunities to learn, too. Caregivers can take group classes, pursue self-directed online education, or browse through materials in the building's library. Care Connections staff—by October, five team members will be located in the building, with office hours from 8:00 until 4:30 can help caregivers navigate benefits available through state and federal programs, as well as private insurance.

Or, if they'd prefer, caregivers can simply take a break. Karla Fales, president and CEO of REAL Services, says her favorite space is the "nap room," a cozy, private room with two recliners. When Baginske meets

with caregivers, her first question is "What would make your day go more smoothly?" For some of the folks who are short on sleep, the answer can be as simple as a nap.

She often consults with caregivers who are in their 80s or 90s frequently, a spouse who is caring for a partner with dementia.

"You always want to keep your spouse at home as long as possible," she says, "but it's incredibly difficult."

Care Connections staff can help by finding creative ways to "de-stress" the caregiver. Baginske mentions a couple where the wife suffered from Lewy body dementia. She had a passionate, lifelong love of travel, and, despite her decline in health, kept insisting to her husband that it was time to leave on a trip. He worried that she might try to leave the house while he was sleeping, putting herself at risk. Baginske's team helped the husband create an activity kit that gave his wife simple, travelrelated activities to do at home-make a packing list, for example—that kept her busy and reduced his anxiety.

"We know when caregivers have access to the kinds of evidence-based programs that Care Connections offers, they're able to keep their loved ones at home up to two years longer,"

says Fales. "This work is so valuable."

# New Cohort Joins 21st Century Scholar Success Fellowship

Now in its second year, the Success Fellowship is helping 21st Century Scholars succeed.

In 2021, the Community Foundation created a new program to support 21st Century Scholars: the 21st Century Scholar Success Fellowship.

Chosen through a competitive application process, 21st Century Success Fellows are students at local colleges and universities who are enrolled in Indiana's 21st Century Scholars program. In addition to their state-funded tuition award, each Fellow receives a \$5,000 award from the Community Foundation.

As Fellows, students participate in opportunities throughout the year that focus on personal leadership development, career preparation, and degree completion—a coaching session about financial literacy, for example, or a tutorial on creating a professional résumé. Fellows also share their experiences with middle school and high school students through school visits, "Ask a Scholar" meet-and-greets, and 21st Century Scholar enrollment and completion events like Scholar Success Fest.

This year's cohort of Fellows consists of 11 students from IU South Bend, Holy Cross, Bethel, and Saint Mary's.
